

2012 ANNUAL MEETING in BOSTON - November 8-10, 2013

Our 2013 meeting will take place November 8-10 at the Westin Hotel in Waltham, MA, on the outskirts of Boston. The theme this year is **Coming Out Religiously: Religion, the Public Sphere, and Religious Identity Formation.** Because religion contributes significantly to the public sphere through its dimension of meaning-making, the government/state has a stake in religious education. We will examine the implications for religious education in public and private schools, the role and contribution of religious communities in the public domain, and the relation of religious education to civic responsibility. Program Chair Siebren Miedema (VU University Amsterdam) is already busy cultivating a lively international conversation on this topic in preparation for what promises to be another lively meeting with an inspiring group of speakers and conversation partners! 2012 ANNUAL MEETING in ATLANTA - IT WAS TERRIFIC!

In spite of Hurricane Sandy, which hit New England just four days before the November meeting, we had a high attendance of 160 at our November meeting in Atlanta! The meeting theme, **"Let Freedom Ring!"—Religious Education at the Intersection of Social Justice, Liberation, and Civil/Human Rights**, proved to be an extremely generative topic, perfectly placed and timed in Atlanta a few days before national elections. A record number of 116 proposals last May resulted in 39 breakout sessions and 66 presentations during the weekend.

In addition, the **first REA poster session** debuted with eight poster presentations. Both presenters and viewers agreed this is a format well worth repeating because it provided more individual conversation and feedback for the presenter, which some presenters said they now preferred to presenting papers!

Another first was our request for presenters to **bring projectors and share** as a way to reduce our high audio-visual expense for annual meetings. Another success! Five people shared their projectors, saving us \$2,800! (We will most likely repeat this practice in 2013.)

The five plenaries interspersed music and dance, singing, small groups, and mentoring with outstanding talks on immigrants, nurturing youth in churches and through the arts, and urban ministry in Atlanta. What powerful experiences and rich conversations! Be sure to check the **Highlights** on the <u>meeting</u> web site for photos from the meeting. Video clips will be added soon. Program Chair Yolanda Smith and her committee produced an outstanding roster of speakers, exhibits, artists, and musicians that stirred our creativity and inspired our praxis.
