# Welcome to all of our new trial members!





Our 2022 fully online annual meeting was — by all accounts (including lots of digital feedback) — a great success! We had the second highest number of participants in a decade of meetings. Participants presented 30 research papers chosen by blind peer review (read them in our <u>Proceedings</u>), led five collaborative workshops, presented posters, met with working groups, mentors, and much more. 

## Welcome to our new JEDI officer Dr. Christine Hong

The Board of Directors is pleased to announce its unanimous decision to appoint as REA's first Justice, Equity, Diversity, and Inclusion (JEDI) Officer, Dr. Christine J. Hong, Associate Professor of Educational Ministry; Director of the DEdMin Program at Columbia Theological Seminary.

According to the Association's Bylaws (recently approved at our Annual Meeting in July 2022) "The DEI officer is responsible for considering REA's interest, commitments and expertise in creating diverse, inclusive, and equitable spaces and events. The DEI Officer will collaborate with the REA leadership to assess the need for, and recommend and/or lead training initiatives on racial justice, cultural diversity, gender differences, disability, sexual harassment, and other topics designed to increase awareness and support of equity and inclusion values."

Dr. Hong is a creative and knowledgeable practical theologian and religious educator. She has a refreshing familiarity with religious institutions and the academy as well as the potential public impact of our field. Her vision for what REA can become is rich with creativity, relevance, optimism, and adaptive change towards justice and equity. # **REA Advisory Council Weighs in on JEDI Processes**

The REA Advisory Committee met at the end of our July annual meeting to discuss the future of the guild's Justice, Equity, Diversity, and Inclusion (JEDI) efforts. The committee is composed annually of those REA members who attend the Advisory Committee to provide perspectives on current opportunities and issues within the organization. In addition to REA officers and staff in *ex officio* roles, the Advisory Committee members for 2022-2023 include: Patricia Bonilla, Peter Cariaga, Chuck Chesnavage, Eileen Daily, Barbara Fears, Eunjin Jeon, Paulus Eko Kristianto, Boyung Lee, Joung-Chul Lee, Annie Lockhart-Gilroy, Mary Love, Fr. Nwabichie, Kimberly Stephens, and Addie Lorraine Walker. (If you attended the meeting, but do not see your name listed here, please email <u>Anne Walker</u> to be added to the committee.)

After welcoming REA's new Justice, Equity, Diversity, and Inclusion Officer, Dr. Christine J. Hong, the committee broke into small groups to discuss what is achievable for REA JEDI in the next twelve months. Given that the JEDI Officer's role is less-than part-time, the focus of the conversation surrounded ways that the guild can support the work of JEDI across the membership community. Small groups discussed pain points related to justice and inclusion in the REA, brainstormed what collaborations might be possible within the next twelve months, and what signals of progress we might identify for our collective work.

Small groups identified pain points that surrounded the following concerns:

- continued concern for white dominance in the implicit and explicit practices of the guild
- room for practitioners and students to contribute, participate and find relevant program content and support for their work
- accessibility for a multi-national audience and for students and practitioners at inperson vs. online annual meetings, especially as this relates to global membership, student members, and members who are practitioners
- centering of U.S. perspectives and experiences
- accessibility of guild resources in multiple languages
- when voices from marginalized groups are lifted up, white colleagues opt out
- a "colonizing methodology" that undergirds the values driving what is considered rigorous scholarship (for both the annual meeting presentations and for the Journal)

The committee shared ideas for collaboration that included regional REA meetings, working together to determine how to broaden what is considered scholarly work, developing a process for clearly documenting pain points, establishing connections with more diverse partner organizations, and hosting honest conversations, fishbowls, and dialogues about JEDI.

Stories and ideas shared at the Advisory Committee meeting will be engaged thoroughly by the REA Steering Committee and Board. Justice, equity, diversity, and inclusion is an effort of mutuality for our guild. Each leader and REA member is asked to continue conversation with the Board about your visions for change and how you will be a part of embodying that change along with us.

#### Tony Vrame receives the St. Romanos the Melodist Medal



We are delighted to note that Tony Vrame, most recently REA's treasurer of many years, was given the St. Romanos the Melodist Medal from the National Forum of Greek Orthodox Church Musicians of the Greek Orthodox Archdiocese of America on July 7, 2022. It was noted that for the 15 years he had served as Director of the Department of Religious Education in that church, where he collaborated closely with the National Forum incorporating the teaching of Greek Orthodox hymnology with the religious education ministries of parishes. He had also worked with them to develop a new hymnal for use in parishes, and to promote the resources of the Forum throughout the Archdiocese.

St. Romanos the Melodist was

a Byzantine hymnographer and composer in the late 5th early 6th century who is a central figure in the history of Byzantine music and responsible for composing many hymns that are still in use in all

Orthodox Churches. Following receiving the award, Archbishop Elpidophoros of America, on behalf of Ecumenical Patriarch Bartholomew bestowed on Tony, who is a Greek Orthodox priest, the title, "Archimandrite of the Ecumenical Throne" which makes him one of the most senior ranked clergy in the Greek Orthodox Church in the United States.

# **REA Leaders Take on Major Administrative Posts**

In further exciting news, José Irizarry and HyeRan Kim-Cragg have both recently taken on major administrative posts.

The Austin Seminary Board of Trustees, at a called meeting on June 27, elected the Reverend Dr. José Ramon Irizarry as the Seminary's next president. Reflecting on conversations with the candidate, Board Chair Keatan King recalled, "Dr. Irizarry lifted up the distinctive gifts of our seminary and gave voice to a hopeful vision of theological education for our time. For José, listening isn't simply a best practice of leadership; it is his spiritual gift-one he has honed in his personal practice of contemplative prayer. José Irizarry will lead Austin Presbyterian Theological Seminary by listening to all members of the community to hear God's dreams, already emerging within us, so he can guide us in reaching our potential."



Since 2016, Irizarry has served as Vice President of Education at the Board of Pensions of the

Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.). A scholar in the field of practical theology, Irizarry teaches at Villanova University and has held teaching and administrative positions at various educational and theological institutions including The University of Cambridge (Visiting Fellow), Lutheran School of Theology, the Pacific School of Religion, and McCormick Theological Seminary.

Out of his expertise as a bilingual educator, Dr. Irizarry directed Cambridge College's regional campus in his native San Juan, Puerto Rico, (2011-2015) and served as academic dean, acting president, and held The Limardo Chair in Practical Theology at the Evangelical Seminary of Puerto Rico (2007-2011). He earned degrees from the University of Puerto Rico (BA), McCormick Theological Seminary (MDiv), and Northwestern University (PhD) as well as professional certifications from the Universitá per Stranieri di Perugia, Italy, Boston College, and Cornell University.

Supporting his work in the field of religious education and intercultural relations, Irizarry has traveled internationally to lead seminars and conferences and to conduct research. He has chaired academic accreditation teams in the US and Puerto Rico and served as president of the Religious Education Association in the United States and Canada. An ordained minister in the PC(USA), he has served the church as member of the Review Committee of the Whole (assessing the work of all agencies of the Presbyterian Church) and on the Committee on Theological Education. He was also a member of the Board of Directors of the Presbyterian Publishing Corporation (Westminster John Knox Press, Geneva Press) for eight years and is currently a Trustee at Columbia Theological Seminary. He served interim pastoral positions at Presbyterian and inter-denominational congregations in Puerto Rico and the US.



The Board of Regents of Victoria University in the University of Toronto is pleased to announce that **The Rev. Dr. HyeRan Kim-Cragg** has been appointed Principal of Emmanuel College beginning on July 1, 2022. The appointment was made following the unanimous recommendation of the Search Advisory Committee.

Dr. Kim-Cragg has been a valued member of the faculty of

Emmanuel College since 2019. She graduated from Emmanuel College in 2006 with a Doctor of Theology and was recognized with the Distinguished Alumni Award in 2021. Dr. Kim-Cragg has had an academic career characterized by intensive research and publishing with a focus on integrating Christian practices with postcolonial, feminist and anti-racist approaches. This is well aligned with Emmanuel's interreligious pedagogical approach and commitment to addressing inequities. Dr. Kim-Cragg will be the first racialized person appointed as Principal in Emmanuel College's history.

As Graduate Degree Director of Emmanuel College and Timothy Eaton Memorial Church Professor of Preaching, Dr. Kim-Cragg has played a pivotal role in evolving the College's pedagogical direction. Previous to her roles at Emmanuel College, Dr. Kim-Cragg was the Lydia Gruchy Chair and Professor of Pastoral Studies at St. Andrew's College in Saskatoon for 10 years. She has influenced many graduates who are actively involved in ministry across the country.

Hailing from the Presbyterian Church in the Republic of Korea (PROK), a denomination with a long-standing relationship with the United Church, Dr. Kim-Cragg is a highly respected scholar, leader and mentor within The United Church of Canada. Dr. Kim-Cragg has also served various ecumenical and theological communities in many capacities including on the Advisory Board of the Women in Leadership (WIL) committee of the Association of Theological Schools (ATS) in U.S.A and Canada and as Dean of the Global Institute of Theology of the World Communion of Reformed Churches (WCRC).

#### Resources

The **Parliament of the World's Religions** regularly <u>issues statements</u> on events that concern religious communities. Recently they reminded us of a statement they issued back in 2016 — <u>"We Resist Despair: A Recommitment to Nonviolence"</u> — which has renewed pertinence in our world today.

There is much going on in research with children and religious education internationally. For instance, <u>The Big Ideas Project and the Commission on RE (CoRE)</u> set up by the **REC (Religious Education Council of England and Wales)** both began in 2016 and arose from similar concerns about the present situation of and future prospects for the school subject, religious education. They have recently set up <u>a website to curate and share</u> ideas from a wide range of settings. A different <u>multi-national research project</u> led by Sarah Holmes at Liverpool Hope University has also issued a report on partnering with parents in supporting children's faith.

The <u>National Institute for Learning Outcomes Assessment</u> (**NILO**) continues to compile <u>a list of anti-racist resources</u> for teaching, learning, and assessment of students.

The <u>National Equity Project</u> (**NEP**) also continues to compile useful resources that have implications far beyond North America.

Jarvis Givens at the **Harvard Graduate School of Education** is developing a <u>Black</u> <u>Teacher Archives Project</u>, and is intent on telling a more complicated story of Black education and Black teacher.

The new **Religious Education Curriculum for Catholic primary and secondary schools in Aotearoa** – <u>To Tātou Whakpono Our Faith</u>– has been approved by the New Zealand Bishops, and the National Centre for Religious Studies there is working hard to develop resources to support its implementation. You can download the curriculum for free.


