### IMAGINING POSSIBILITY

By examining both online and offline spaces and ways Black women read and write, I want to emphasize the networks of resistance that arise between Black women who build salons or gathering places in person to strategize and black women's responses regarding rest online in the aftermath of the elections. Around these sites of possibility, I examine shifting networks of inperson and digitally located hush harbors.

### WHY IT MATTERS



Alternative models for religious education

A Reclamation of the human in technology (is womanist work).

From their inception salons were considered sites of white women intellectualism. Coexisting alongside them and remaining today are Black women's sites of intellectual meaning making. These hush harbors offer rich sites for understanding Black networks of learning and resistance.

Black women's creation and use of technology for spiritual and religious purposes are often oriented around her community and her personhood. This offers a needful model for reflection and critique of exisiting technologies that decenter the human in its development, analysis, and/or implementation.



### IL THE CONNECTED FAITH SURVEY



### About

The Connected Faith Survey consists of a 48-questions focused on the digital religious beliefs and practices of those who self-identify as Black.

Between November 22-March 2023 roughly 400 participants took the survey.

### SOCIAL V. SPIRITUAL CONNECTIONS

Younger participants are more likely to emphasize the use of technology as important for spiritual encounters, while older participants prioritize the use of technology for social connection and cohesion.<sup>4</sup>




### **KEY POINT:**

Among all religious affiliation groups, those who identified as Protestant Christians were most likely to spend time online participating in religious or spiritual exchanges.


