

Exciting plans for the REA Annual Meeting 2024 in July!

We are now just a day away from REA2024, our annual meeting July 8-12. We will be exploring the theme "Dear Earth: Innovating Religious Education Through the Lens of Climate Justice." The world is on fire: we know it in our bones and feel it in our hearts. Science, sociology and other disciplines describe dire scenarios as oceans rise, cities warm, and species decline. We know humanity's most vulnerable populations will suffer most severely. These challenging times demand our attention as religious educators, in and out of institutions, to mitigate harm when possible, create new rituals of grief and lament when needed, and stir human creativity on behalf of all beings. Our program chair, Dori Baker and Wanda Stahl, has worked hard with the REA Board to put together a compelling program that will take place entirely online using the Zoom platform.

The online conference is included with your membership fees, which means that you have to be a current member to receive the various zoom links. The zoom links are only emailed to you in the half hour before the session. The link will also be on the schedule for every session when the session is active and you are logged in. On that note, we ask that you sign up for sessions using our online schedule so that we can facilitate good moderation and so that you can access the various resources — complete papers, workshop outlines, and other additional tools — that you will need to engage fully in the meeting.

There is still time to register and nominate people for a year's <u>trial membership</u>. Nominate someone who has never been to REA before for a free trial membership. Doing so means they will have access to the annual meeting and one year of digital access to REA journal.

Plenary sessions are organized in collaborative and experiential ways that draw on wisdom from scholars and practitioners across the globe. You can find a robust set of biographies and other information at the conference website. Here is a sneak peak of the many sessions that will occur in this learning space:

Monday, July 8 plenary: Refugia Futures and Corridors of Belonging

The biological concept of refugia is used as a metaphor by <u>Debra Rienstra</u> to highlight the importance of local focus combined with global connection. Rienstra will moderate this panel conversation for <u>Daniel Foor</u>, and <u>Melanie Harris</u>, engaging worldviews informed by Ecowomanist, Animist, and Christian perspectives.

<u>Tuesday, July 9 plenary: The Harmony Way: Decolonizing Our Worldviews</u> for Climate Futures

Indigenous scholars and practitioners Randy and Edith Woodley use multiple platforms to help people deconstruct colonial worldviews from Native American perspectives. These platforms include academic books, children's books, pedagogical innovation of theological education, regenerative Indigenous design, and hosting learning journeys at their farm near Portland, OR. This dialogical session will include Randy and Edith's story of founding Eloheh Indigenous Center for Earth Justice and Eloheh Farm & Seeds and what they are learning as they invite people to transform to a more indigenous worldview.

<u>Tuesday, July 9 plenary: Fire Salons: Grief Processing and Mobilization in Sacred Community</u>

In a world on fire, grief cannot be held alone. Processing in a beloved community moves us towards healing and collective action. In the fall of 2021 at Harvard Divinity School, HDS Author in Residence Terry Tempest Williams and former Religion and Public Life Climate Justice researcher, Anna Del Castillo, shared a vision of building a circle community to process grief, climate catastrophe, and the devastation of an ongoing pandemic. Around an outdoor fire-pit, sacred conversations and healing transpired. Join Fire Salon facilitators, Maya Pace and Anna Del Castillo to learn about circle processing and leave inspired to spark your own Fire Salon.

Wednesday, July 10 plenary: Beautiful Journeys Back to Earth, Land, and Justice: Profits and Prophets in Food and Faith

The Black Church Food Security Network is a national network of Black churches organizing to help Black churches use their assets to establish gardens on their land, host miniature farmer's markets, and buy wholesale from Back farmers. This conversation between its founder Heber Brown and religious educator Timothy L. Van Meter will illuminate challenges and opportunities in addressing food insecurity.

Thursday, July 11 plenary: Spiritual Leadership for a Climate Changed World

The mission of <u>The BTS Center</u>, the successor organization to Bangor Theological Seminary, now based in Portland, ME, USA, is to catalyze spiritual imagination with enduring wisdom for transformative faith leadership in a climate-changed world. In this session, members of the The BTS Center staff will share stories and learnings based on their formational programming and applied research with spiritual leaders and faith communities

<u>Thursday, July 11 Circle Process: Conversation on Religious Education in Violent Times</u>

For this one hour session, we welcome anyone with a story to share how you are living into your vocation as a religious educator in times of crisis, violence, and grief. REA board members and staff will co-facilitate circle processes in small groups and hold space for storytelling. We invite you to bring personal stories as scholars and practitioners navigating teaching and learning in turbulent times.

Friday, July 12 plenary: Art, Theater and Ritual in Fostering Climate Justice

This session will include a viewing of the original play "When Wajcha Meets Pachamama" by Cláudio Carvalhaes, filmed at Union Theological Seminary in January 2024. Following the play, Cláudio will lead a conversation about the role of ritual, art, and theater in fostering climate justice around the world.

In addition to these plenary sessions, many members are excited to share their work through breakout and poster sessions. You can read the research interest group papers for the sessions you choose by clicking on the session in the schedule, and then on the link within the description. You must be logged in to access the papers.

Despite the ongoing challenge of different time zones, there will be multiple ways to engage with other members during the meeting, including working groups and student gatherings.

Live translation offered in Spanish, Korean, and Indonesian

REA continues to offer language translations for plenaries. Language translation was first offered for the 2023 REA annual meeting, asking the following question: What if we could bring the multiplicity of lingual diversity together to our gatherings beyond performative practice? This year, we continue this initiative. In addition to Spanish and Korean, we have added Indonesian.


Join an in-person gathering along with our online meeting
